Energy - Edward Haynes—9th February

Edward, who was introduced by his father David, is an engineer by training who has a career background working for Cosworth Engines & the Williams Formula 1 motor racing team. He has recently joined Libertine [Free Piston Engines] which is developing a suite of 'Linear Power System' technologies for use in a wide range of power generation, heating, cooling and transport applications.

To set his own work in context he provided an overview of the current debate regarding the future of energy supply in general. He identified three particular concerns that drive the debate, namely sustainability, energy security and evidence of climate change. The challenge for energy supply and energy technology companies will be to produce energy that is sustainable and secure yet which does not contribute to further global warming.

He examined the potential that exists for renewable energy sources to meet this challenge as far as the UK's energy needs are concerned. Hydro power has little role to play & whilst wind, solar and wave & tide all have contributions to make, in practical terms, even taken together, they will not provide anything but a small percentage of the energy needed. Cost will be one constraint and public opinion another. The solution will inevitably come from a 'multi-stream' approach using a mixture of renewable and conventional sources and it is within this mix that Libertine's work on 'linear power systems' can be found.

The company is developing an energy recovery system that seeks to capture an extra 15-20% of the waste heat from existing engines and, through the use of a linear motor generator, convert it into electrical power. The system remains in development but has the potential to be applied to a wide range of small scale energy conversion applications. Whilst it will not on its own provide the 'magic bullet' to resolve our energy needs, it has the potential to make a significant

contribution to energy efficiency and power generation. All in all, an interesting talk on an exciting, important and, hopefully, profitable area of engineering research.

Young Chef Competition

Each of the 16 students produced a three course meal for two people. Ellie -Mae Burke for this club served chicken

kebabs with mango salsa preceded by smoked salmon pots and followed with raspberry and kiwi tarts.

The judges were impressed by the high standard of achievement but neither of the Lutterworth entrants gained a winning place.

The first place went to the student entered by Towcester Rotary Club who will proceed to the regional final at Grimsby.

CROSS COUNTIES RADIO LUTTERWORTH.

Operations Manager, Chairman and Founder of Cross Counties Radio, David Harris Boutler, was a recent visitor to the Rotary Club Monday lunch. David joined the Rotarians for lunch, prior to informing the club of the radio stations plans for its short term future, which includes creating a further 'third radio station' available to on-line internet listeners (Cross Counties Radio Three) which will specialise in music from the 1960's, 70's, 80's and 90s - as well as providing the same locally generated news and information created by all of the stations 40 volunteers at the Cross Counties Radio Studio based inside Lutterworth College.

The radio station created a local studio in association with the Sir Frank Whittle Studio School and Lutterworth College two years ago and has been a real success story with students gaining access to free professional media training and resources and community residents (after 5pm - 9pm weekdays) who join the group. Cross Counties Radio provides this service to the college and community at no-cost as part of a partnership academy between the station and school in which the end result is to provide much social gain to participants from the local area as broadcasters - and - the local listeners from across Leicestershire and Warwickshire alike. From 10 initial students initially trained from the college - five have now gone on to have their own weekly radio shows on the station and Cross Counties Radio is about to begin a new recruitment of volunteers both from the college and local residential community to build on the success.

Cross Counties Radio also officially announced at the Rotary Lunch, the clubs intentions to launch a two-year side project, which, if successful, will see Cross Counties Radio One broadcast live on the FM/VHF or AM platform as well as on-line ... however, there is much work to do and many years of work is expected before the Government would consider an application. Cross Counties Radio will continue in the meantime,

building it's portfolio of niche on-line radio stations that all share the same local news and information content between the 'Cross Counties' brand name.

Cross Counties Radio is now recruiting potential radio presenters (with no experience is necessary) for Cross Counties Radio Three. The station is planned to launch this Spring / Summer with the sounds of the 60's, 70's and 80's being it's core music and wants local people who appreciate music from these years to come along and get free training. The group has now raised £500 towards the necessary £1,000 required to launch Cross Counties Radio Three and hopes to have the remaining funds in place with the help of donations and advertising from any organisations that feel they can support this objective.

Cross Counties Radio is a not-for-profit club and is not a business. It has no paid staff at all. Our Patron is Sir Edward Garnier and we have over 27,000 regular listeners who tune-in on Smart Phones, Smart TV's, Smart WiFi Radio's (available from

J Wells and Son for less than £99) and also available to listen through our website at www.crosscountiesradio.co.uk The focal area of Cross Counties Radio is Lutterworth, Harborough, Oadby, Wigston, Blaby, Rugby, Nuneaton, Bedworth, Binley and Atherstone - but does not exclude news and local information from any other part of Leicestershire and Warwickshire if we believe it would be of interest to our listener's.

Cross Counties Radio **One** = Music from 80's, 90's, 00's and Today

Cross Counties Radio **Two** = Music from Local Singer Songwriters and Original Independent Artists and Musicians

Cross Counties Radio **Three** = Music from 60's, 70's, 80's and 90's

CCR FM will be a mix of all of these stations if we are successful in acquiring a Government licence for Lutterworth.

To listen to Cross Counties Radio **One** - or - Cross Counties Radio **Two** on your Smart Phone, download our apps from your App Store ... just search Cross Counties Radio and listen live to radio programming created from Lutterworth - from Community to County - 24 Hours a day.

Annual Membership to Cross Counties Radio is £24 (for Adult members) and participants get all the support they need from a team of volunteers on the equipment - as well as an official press badge and special limited edition members square Cross Counties Radio badge - to begin your journey please leave a message on 0116 326 3000 and one of our volunteers will call you back to arrange a meeting at the studio. This is open to anyone from 16 to 60+ years of age.
