## **The Falklands Conflict 1982**

John Norton our speaker gave us a very full account of the event in which he was involved.

*The following is but a précis of the notes he sent me – a full copy is available (issued separately all seven A4 pages) should anyone wish to have a full read of his talk.*

John was a Section Commander in 3 Coy, 2 Para and at the age of 26 (having been in the Army for 9 years) he was deployed to the Falklands following the invasion of the island on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 1982. On 3<sup>rd</sup> April the first task force elements the Aircraft Carriers Hermes, Invincible and others set sail. The marine commandos sailed off on the Canberra while other ships joined the task force.

His company being assigned to the Norland (27,000 tonne) a requisitioned North Sea Ferry used as a troop ship, which was fitted in Hull with a helipad. So in his words they were going to the South Atlantic on a North Sea Ferry sailing through the roaring forties renown for its rough seas. She was brilliant – very stable, the crew, still civvies all volunteered to stay with the ship were fantastic.

On 26<sup>th</sup> April they sailed from Portsmouth arriving at the 200 mile exclusion zone around the island on 30<sup>th</sup> having stopped in Freetown Sierra Leone for refuelling.

Salient dates mentioned in his talk were:-

2<sup>nd</sup> May Belgrano sunk by a British submarine.

4<sup>th</sup> May HMS Sheffield hit by exocet missile.

6<sup>th</sup> May arrived in Ascension Island

21<sup>st</sup> May they landed at San Carlos – being met by the SBS (*Special Boat Service*).

He recalled it was the Falklands Winter where most days they had rain, wind, sun and snow all in one day. He recounted the view from San Carlos and the attacks on the ships in the bay. The Ardent and Antelope being sunk.

From there they marched to Goose Green where he gave a detailed account of his next few days under attack. (*See notes talked about*

*earlier in the Blue Book).*

On 8<sup>th</sup> June he saw Sir Galahad engulfed in flame and smoke and assisted pulling in the lifeboats.

On 13<sup>th</sup> June they started to round up prisoners captured from the previous days heavy fighting.

The Surrender took place on 14<sup>th</sup> June. His reminiscences of Stanley at the time were vivid as being a mess having had 6,000 Argentinians in the town.

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### **Familiar Faces in Cornwall.**

*Report from John Cookson (RC Lutterworth Wycliffe) on Shelter Boxes*

When Rotarians John Cookson and his wife, Vanessa (Blaby Meridian) made a visit to Cornwall recently, they decided to make a visit to Helston to the Shelterbox International site. Here Vanessa presented a cheque from her club for the purchase of a Shelterbox in the wake of the Nepal Earthquake disaster. On their very informative visit around the premises, it was with some delight that they saw some familiar faces from Lutterworth in the shape of Elaine Turner's teddies.

Teddies are often sent out with Shelterboxes, however, it was interesting to learn about the cultural problems that prevent them being sent to some countries – and particularly Islamic countries. Shelterbox has stores pre-located in various countries – including Dubai to speed up the delivery of the boxes to less-accessible parts of the world.



“Unfortunately, we learned that, even though the teddies might only be in transit through Dubai, it is illegal to import and store them there. All the same, wherever it is possible to include these in the boxes, Shelterbox does this and they are gratefully received.”

“Vanessa and I also discovered that aid through the organisation is not limited just to the boxes. A shelter pack is also provided in many areas where basic tools to aid in the re-building of the victims home might be of more use. These contain essential tools, ropes and strong plastic sheets to enable victims quickly to create temporary shelters for themselves. These kits are particularly cost effective at roughly just 10% of the cost of a full Shelterbox. Water filtration kits are now also available to be sponsored and sent independently of the kits.”  
The tour of ShelterBox was very interesting and it is well worth doing a visit if you are in that area.
