AfriKids - 22nd June

Rob Adams - Hugh Robertson Smithy's Speaker spoke with passion about a recent trip he had made to North East Ghana on a project with **AfriKids**.

He illustrated his talk with pictures which enhanced his talk greatly (a picture speaks a thousand words).

The Charity's mission is work in partnership with a Ghanaian Non-Governmental organisation (AfriKids Ghana) working together to protect and promote child rights in Northern Ghana.

They operate under 6 headings:-

Child Protection *Preventing suffering violence, abuse, neglect or exploration and providing a safe home.*



Health Care *Ensuring children and families understand and value good health and well being and have access to quality health-care facilities and services as needed.*



Education *Ensuring children and communities value access and complete a good quality education which provides a platform to livelihood security*



Rights and Advocacy *Ensuring the basic human rights of children are understood, valued and met by children and their communities.*



Livelihoods *Empowering parents meet the rights of their children by creating their own financial security and receiving family planning and care advice*



Social Enterprise *Enabling responsible business that creates jobs, provides quality goods and services and generates profit to fund AfriKids work.*

Presidents Change over Day and Walk

Following lunch and after the induction to Rotary of Bernard Duesbury, Martin Iliffe handed over the President's Chain of Office to his successor, John Wilson. John thanked the members present for their confidence in him and said he looked forward to an interesting and successful year ahead. The new



President's first duty was to present Martin with his Past President's jewel.

After lunch, approximately 22 Rotarians and guests made their way to Burton Fields Farm where John Ensor and Bridget hosted a lovely sunny afternoon farm visit.

The party were first shown around a recently developed museum, exhibiting old agricultural vehicles, some dating back from the early 1800s, fully restored and in immaculate condition. Of particular interest was a steam ploughing engine, which is believed to be the only surviving one of that type in the world, and a wonderful horse drawn, enclosed Brougham carriage which some of us chose to sit in and were transported back to days gone by.

Also of interest was a Model T Ford car.

John then gave an overview of the arable farming enterprise, with a visit to the huge grain stores with their underfloor drying system, together with the very impressive range of cultivating, harvest-



ing and spraying equipment. The huge size and complexity of these machines was absolutely amazing. They had to be seen to be believed!

We then walked through crops of barley and oilseed rape to visit the lake and see the cygnets feeding.

Our memorable change over afternoon was concluded with a delicious tea and homemade cakes served in the garden. Many thanks to John and Bridget.

Monday 6th July – Rev'd Charlie Styles and John Wells *(Diamond Wedding).*

It was a memorable lunch as we celebrated the Diamond Wedding of Margaret and John Wells, the 75th birthday of Steve Tallis and the induction of Roger Rose as Senior Vice President.

The Rev'd Charlie Styles (Priest-in-Charge) of Lutterworth with Bitteswell and Cotesbach reflected upon his first two years in the Benefice. His talk certainly dispelled any idea people may have that it is a one day a week job. He and his family have found Lutterworth a very different but welcoming place compared to the parish he left as curate in a very run down area of Slough.



Charlie is married to Sophie with three children under seven years of age, a time consuming young family added to his role in the Church and the many and varied things he has become involved with in the community and surrounding two villages. During his short time with us the three churches have seen changes to worship patterns, the setting up of the Lutterworth Food Bank, the Debt Advisory Service and structural changes at Lutterworth Church and currently the building of an extension at Cotesbach.

He touched upon some significant funerals he had taken, one the suicide of a young schoolgirl very soon after he arrived and how much he had learnt from the handling of national media that descended upon the town. More recently the tragic death of a young schoolboy killed on his bicycle near Gilmorton.

Away from the church he discovered on arrival that he sits as a trustee on the boards of two local charities "Lutterworth Town Estates" and "United Charities Bittteswell". He was amused to find that he is the only Trustee of the land upon which Bitteswell School stands and that it cannot be sold without his permission.

He is on the Governing Body of three local schools and Chair of the Board of Directors of Lutterworth College. At the College amongst many other things he has been involved in the setting up of a Chaplaincy.

His talk concluded with an overview of education in Lutterworth and Bitteswell and his vision of the future for education in the area which on the whole was good.

Lucy Air Ambulance for Children

Elaine's Knitted Teddy Bears have now exceeded 5,000 - the latest consignment being sent to Lucy Air Ambulance for children (*Life's Care for the Young*) which co-ordinates road and the air ambulance service for sick children between hospitals. It originated in Scotland and now operates in England operating from Coventry Airport, and can reach anywhere in the UK within two hours reaching all of the UK's specialist children's units within 70 minutes. Children and clinical teams are moved using an [AgustaWestland AW109](#) helicopter, which was leased by the charity in October 2012. It has a top speed of 185 mph. The helicopter always flies with two pilots and, when transporting a child, generally carries a paediatrician and a specialist nurse on board.

Children are transported in a bespoke stretcher (certified for flight) which was designed and built in partnership with consultant paediatricians and transport nurses.

No specialised stretcher for paediatric helicopter transfer

existed at the time. The stretcher was nicknamed 'Shrek' because the first one was painted green. 'Shrek' can carry a baby up to 8 kg being in a specialist 'baby pod', or facilitate larger babies and children on the stretcher mattress.

The stretcher design allows for the equipment needed for paediatric intensive care to be secure and easily operated, whether in flight or on the ground. Each of the six transport teams the charity currently works with has its own 'Shrek' stretcher.

When a child is too sick or not able to travel, the Children's Air Ambulance will transfer specialists from the Clinical Partner Team to a local hospital.

The helicopter is not an emergency helicopter, but a transfer vehicle for children and specialist teams to and from hospitals across the country.
