Magna Park Lutterworth is IDI Gazeley's flagship distribution park.

It was established in 1988 and celebrated its 25th anniversary in 2013. It was the UK's first and, at 200 hectares, remains Europe's largest dedicated distribution location. It is home to 25 blue-chip companies who operate from 31 buildings totalling in excess of 922,000 sq metres of sustainable floor space and employ 9,300 people.

Magna Park is a private estate that is fully managed by IDI Gazeley with 24 hour access and security and controlled HGV circulation.

The Park, and each individual warehouse site, is set in a fully landscaped, parkland environment that was one of the early pioneers of the still innovative "eco-system" approach to landscape design for commercial developments. IDI Gazeley's management stringently maintains and preserves the park's natural habitat and wildlife. The later buildings feature energy saving, sustainable features which are designed to reduce their resource consumption and carbon footprint, and many of the occupiers of the older buildings are investing to bring theirs up to date

IDI Gazeley developed the Park on the site of the former Bitteswell Airfield in two main phases. Harborough District Council (HDC) granted outline planning permission for the first phase in 1987 when IDI Gazeley pioneered the distribution park concept in the UK, and the Secretary of State for the Environment, with HDC's support, granted permission for the second phase in 1992.

In response to growing demand from existing Magna Park businesses and other blue chip businesses, IDI Gazeley has aspirations to expand Magna Park. A detailed planning application has been submitted by IDI Gazeley on behalf of DHL Supply Chain for a single warehouse extending to 100,844 sq metres. A decision by Harborough District Council is expected shortly.

Report below from notes taken at the meeting

Update on Development of Magna Park—7th September

Gwyn Stubbings Planning Director of IDI Gazeley (part of Brookfield Logistics Properties of America) gave us a very detailed talk on the current development taking place and planned for Magna Park.

The site, comprising of over 550 acres (202 hectares) was originally acquired by the then MFI Group plc in 1987 to develop for distribution warehousing. Gazeley Properties Ltd then a wholy owned subsidiary of Asda had responsibility for carrying out the development. Outline planning permission was granted in 1987 for Magna Park Phase 1 to take place for 4.21 million sq ft (392,000 sq m).

During the '80's the take up of land was rapid and a planning permission for a second phase of 3.5 million sq ft (325,160 sq m) was granted in 1992.

Today Planning Permission is being sort for in a further expansion of the site which if granted will create employment for a further 9,200 people. They have submitted an initial application for a DHL warehouse the size of 16 football pitches to add to their existing four units totalling more than 55 sq. m and employing 700 people. An interesting point was that 95% of the UK population can be covered within 9 hours driving from the site explaining the interest warehouse operators are taking in the area. DIRFT and its railway link in Rugby and Gateway Estate was mentioned in question time but not fully discussed due to shortage of time. During his talk he went on to say that with this further expansion, if permitted would generate some £20 million of rates for the area and that over a million trees had already been planted to mask the site of the new buildings that would be created.

An interesting talk that generated more questions than answers.

A career by accident – Sally Hollis

Like so many of us Sally was never sure of what she wanted to do in life and life took its turns by accident. Whilst in her twenties she worked as a Mental Welfare Officer, (and subsequently a social worker). An opportunity presented itself in 1973 for Sally and her husband to begin their own business in Data Processing. The business collected data for input by punch card and processing on a large mainframe ICL 1900 computer, with magnetic tape drives.

The fledgling business called Arden Data Processing was supported by also running an off-licence providing the essentials of food, wine and cigarettes! After two children and a divorce Sally took over the Managing Director role of the business which moved into Data Base Management in the Direct Marketing business. By the mid 80's she had gained qualifications in Marketing and was Chair of the Direct Marketing Association's Response Management Council .

The Business – Arden Direct Marketing Ltd – which moved to Barwell Leicester, employed over 75 people engaged in a highly mechanised mailing house and call centre.

The new millennium however saw the rise of email marketing and a decrease in direct mail volumes. The company was renamed Arden Direct Digital, but Sally sought an exit.

Little did Sally know that her exit was to be so dramatic. On December 29th 2012, whilst Sally was away in Paris, the 30,000 square feet of mailing house was raised to the ground by a large fire, caused by an arson attack! After a horrific time of over 18 months dealing with claims and officials, Arden was successfully acquired by the remaining loyal staff in an MBO.

Sally retired in Jan 2015 and joined Rotary.
