Youth Exchange 5th October

Chris Durham of Market Harborough Rotary gave us a very interesting talk on "Rotary Youth Exchange" and how he initially got involved in it.

The age group being 16 – 19 years

STEP as it is now called "The Short Term Exchange Program" is a brief 'summertime' exchange where students travel abroad for a brief period of time to experience family life in another part of the world. He said that the STEP programme can have a brilliant impact on the students expanding their knowledge, understanding and vision of the world.

He went on to say that it can create a strong relationship between the Rotary Club and the school sending the student – *something we already have in Lutterworth*. It also goes a long way in embedding a foreign language with the student – something which gives people a better understanding of how another part of the world perceive the world which is so important when trading abroad in later life.

His talk was both very detailed and inspiring.

the progress being made a year into the £191 million project.

A party of around 20 attended where we were split into two groups. One being told in their conference room where the project time line had reached while the second party duly clad in high-viz jacket, trousers, helmet and boots went out on site and upon their return the routine was reversed We toured in one of their transit vans to making it safe for us to cross the lines of traffic which has miraculously kept flowing during all the changes made necessary in improving the junction—all 157,000 vehicles per day where the M1, M6 and A14 merge.

Six of the 11 main bridges needed have been completed one of which is on three levels which we saw on our tour of the site.

Lutterworth College trip to Kenya

Catherine Nunn, Jasmine Latham and their teacher Danny Laywood came to tell us of their trip to Kenya over the Summer.

35 students/volunteers took part in visiting a school in Nakuru the 4th largest town in Kenya with a population of around 300,000 and situated about 5,000 ft. above sea level just North of Nairobi.

Nakuru was the former capital of the Rift Valley Province and therefore a well established town.



The students had to raise a princely sum of £2,500 to be included in the party which lasted approx. 2 weeks.

The group was split into four groups covering education, construction completing a school extension which gave the school more space for their students plus the opportunity to



get involved in teaching some of the younger ones who start school at four.

We were told that state education starts at 4 years old and continues, at the moment, until the age of 12 thereafter

education has to be funded by parents or the family.

The school they were involved in had a student population (albeit younger) much the same size as Lutterworth College (2,000 strong).

When asked where the name Nakuru came from we were told it came from the Maasai speaking people.

The main economy of the area comes from Agriculture, Manufacture and Tourism.

Agriculture being based on Coffee, Wheat, Barley, Maize and Beans plus Dairy farming with Manufacturing based on agriculture. Being a large community they have a large University "Egerton University" and are said to be the cleanest city in East Africa.

At the weekend they were taken to Lake Nakuru National Park and were able to see the local animals in the wild such



as rhinos, zebras, buffalo, giraffe and flamingoes for which the area is renown.

An experience they will never forget.

They all said it was a trip of a lifetime and were very sorry to have to say "good bye" to the kids they had bonded with so well over such a short time.

As both Catherine and Jasmine both said life here is so different.

A rise in Rotary membership

It was good to read in Rotary Today that Rotary could report an increase in New Members last year across the World—45,000—mainly thanks to China and the Far East with 11 clubs in China while in Britain and Ireland we have a challenge to maintain and increase our membership.
