Bernard Duesbury - Profile - 1st February

Bernard Duesbury, born 15th June 1953, one of eight children, born in Salford, moving to Whitefield and then Fleetwood.

As a teenager when still at school, during the week Bernard had a paper round, at weekends Bernard also had a job as a "kitchen porter" at the UCP Strand Restaurant in Blackpool.

He told us that he was so impressed with this type of business, his first permanent job was as a Commis Chef at the UCP Restaurant chain. He attended Blackpool Catering College, completing his City and Guilds Certificate

Bernard then moved to a new role at Stannylands Hotel where the 'hands on interview' lasted 4 hours as he needed to demonstrate to the Head Chef he had the basic skills.

He told us that those who influenced were, and are still today, Georges Auguste Escoffier, and Henri Paul Pellaprat. With a

smile on his face he said his first dish was 'Aux Pommes a l'Anglaise'.

He then moved on and joined Liptons Supermarket. Initially starting as a trainee manager responsible for the delicatessen counter and slowly moving up the ranks to become a Store Manager.

In order to help him get about he bought himself a motor-cycle which enabled him to work in various stores in the area. His weekly pay as a store manager was £84.54p.

Having seen a number of sales representatives come into the stores he was on the move again and he took a decision to move into sales. His first company was Pedigree Toys, selling Star Trek and Super Heroes but after a short time with them the market dynamics changed as the likes of Space Invaders became big business and therefore Pedigree Toys no longer existed. This enabled him to move to a small Company called Bambola Toys based in Kettering—selling Children's Educational toys to Fenwicks, House of Fraser, Early Learning, Independent Toy Shops and direct to schools.

An opportunity came up, so in 1986 he moved to Allied Breweries, selling Skol, Castlemaine Tetleys to National Account Hotel Groups, Prison Officers Clubs, Butlins, Blackpool Piers Winter Gardens, Blackpool Tower, British Railways Clubs and the Student Union outlets in the North West.


Over a period of time, Allied Breweries merged with Carlsberg and became Carlsberg UK. During this period Bernard had various roles, including Sales Executive, Regional Sales Manager, National Account Manager, Induction Manager, Training and Development Manager, Representative for UK colleagues at the Carlsberg Representative forum, and represented Carlsberg UK at the European Works Council.

He was also part of a team raising £2,500 for Help for Heroes and £2,000 for Children in Need. He gained a number of certificates and recognitions which included :-CIM certificate, Category Management in Marketing, PG Dip in Sales and Marketing, and National Licensee Certificate.

John Wycliffe — Tony Hirons 8th February

Tony Hirons gave us a detailed talk on the life of John Wycliffe and his association with Lutterworth (*Tony has written a short summary for me which is given below*).

John Wycliffe was an English theologian, philosopher, church reformer, and, with his followers during his time in Lutterworth, completed the first complete translation of the Bible into English. He is widely considered to be one of the forerunners of the Protestant Reformation.



Wycliffe was born in Hipswell, a small hamlet and part of the Manor of Wycliffe on Tees, in the North Riding of Yorkshire. His exact date of birth is not known and depending on which reference book you read could have been as early as 1318 and as late as 1330, but popular belief is somewhere around 1320.

After early schooling, in his early teenage years he was accepted for Oxford.

During his time at Oxford he was associated with three colleges, Queens College, Merton College and predominantly, Balliol College. He became Master of Balliol in 1360.

Initially at Oxford he studied natural science & mathematics and completed an Arts degree at Merton College in 1356. On being made Master of Balliol in 1361 he was able to study philosophy and theology. The root of the Wycliffe's reformation movement

must be traced to his Bible study and to the ecclesiastical-political law making of his times.

Other events in the country had a dramatic effect on Wycliffe none more so than The Plague—The Black Death, which broke out in 1347.

In 1373, when a Royal delegation was sent to the Council of Bruges to address a papal commission, Wycliffe was a crown delegate. It was his performance, speaking out against the Pope's influence and rights to benefices in England, which was largely responsible for the King granting Wycliffe the royal living of Lutterworth.

Wycliffe's work and preaching meant that he was continually being charged with heresy, firstly at St Pauls in 1374 and again in 1378, at Lambeth, where only the intervention of the Queen Mother, Joan of Kent, saved him from a formal judgement. Finally, at his trial at Blackfriars in 1381 he was barred from teaching and expelled from Oxford. He retired to Lutterworth where in 1383 the translation of the Vulgate bible was completed.

On 28th December 1384 he suffered a second stroke and died on 31st December 1384.

In 1415 The Council of Constance condemned Wycliffe of 267 heresies and in 1428 The Bishop of Lincoln supervised his bones being removed from his grave, burned and thrown into the local river, the River Swift.
