Hambleton Bakery nr Oakham Tuesday 19th July

A Party of 18 visited the Bakery on a glorious summer day where we were taken round by their head Bread Maker giving us an insight into the art of making good bread and the specialised flour used such as Patisserie Blanche, Maud Foster Mill Boston, Wychwood and Gluten Free to name but a few.



Julian our guide gave us a few tips as to how to keep bread in good condition until ready to eat such as allowing the bread to breathe. Ideally in an open top bread bin covered with a tea towel or a closed bread bin with really large

air holes. Then advice from Julian for refreshing a day old French stick by sprinkling it with water, before putting in the oven 180° F for about 8 minutes. He went on to say the French dunk the whole stick in a bucket of water before the reheating process. A really good visit enjoyed by all with purchases from the Bakery shop to take home. Some of the group went on to Barnsdale Gardens in the afternoon.



Enterprise Centre will go it alone as a charity

I have extracted an article from the Harborough Mail this week which I thought would be of interest to members who were not involved in the early days when the Club were involved in decorating the premises provided by Mike Coates.

A practical education centre which has been attached to Lutterworth College for the last 12 years is to become an independent charity.

Lutterworth Enterprise Centre provides high quality pastoral care for students

aged between 9 and 18 and an alternative curriculum. The centre which has specialist teachers in practical areas including woodwork, PC maintenance, arts and crafts, horticulture, hand care, cooking and wallpapering, will now provide a service for all schools in Leicestershire, Warwickshire and Northamptonshire.



Ofsted reports have judged The Enterprise Centre "outstanding" and students who attend benefit greatly from the high quality provision, making rapid progress. Students can attend for a single session, half day or full day.

Courses are also offered for adults and community groups.

John Turner's guest speaker was Hannah Surtees who has, until very recently, been Lutterworth Town Clerk after being in the job for the past 11½ years. Her only reason for leaving was that with two young boys 2 and 3 she was finding it difficult to

be a mum and give the demanding job the attention she felt she needed to give it justice.

She told us that in June 2006 when she took on the job she was proud to be the youngest Town Clerk in the country at the age of 23. An achievement of which she was and is still very proud.

She told us about a great number of achievements she had been involved in with Lutterworth Town Council and went on to name some realised over the past decade, such as -

The refurbishment of the Memorial Gardens which saw new lighting, benches and landscaping using Yorkstone paving .

£120k funding from the Big Lottery towards the refurbishment of Coventry Road play area in 2008.

The four Stone Horse feature on Regent Court embankment which was commissioned to commemorate Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee in 2012 is a reminder of the 4 Coaching Inns in Lutterworth.



New signage which was recently installed in an effort to inform tourists of Lutterworth Museum and St Mary' Church.

The relocation of the Town Council Offices to the former library.

Going on Social Media (419) followers and Twitter (807).

The acquisition of burial land at the junction of Coventry Road and Brookfield Way and hard fought battles concerning local services at the Fielding Palmer Hospital and the completion of the Western Relief Road. to name just a few

of the projects she has been involved with.

It will be sad to see her go but may we thank her for her dedication in achieving so much for Lutterworth during her watch as Town Clerk.
