Talk on Polio Plus and Polio 30th April

Barry Hackett from the Foundation Team on Polio Eradication spoke to the Club on 30th April about Rotary's effort to eradicate Polio World Wide.

He started by asking members if they knew exactly what Polio and Polio Plus were. He then went on to explain that Polio was a virus hosted by the human gut where the disease goes on to cause handicap or death. Regrettably it is **not curable** at the moment **but** is **preventable**.

The Polio Plus campaign organised by Rotary International in 1985 and more recently has been joined by the Bill Gates Foundation

The UK is safe from Polio by routine Polio inoculations. The first at 8 weeks of age and is part of a 6 in 1 inoculation given as a single jab. The vaccines protect against six separate diseases - diphtheria—tetanus—whooping cough—polio—hepatitis (type B) and meningitis in young children. This injection is repeated at 12 weeks—16 weeks and then a booster at 3 years 4 months (pre—school). This is followed at 14 years old as a booster dose.

This as he explained was a total of 5 inoculations against Polio.

Various outbreaks have occurred and have been recorded prior to the start of Rotary's intervention in 1985—namely Sweden, Norway, Australia and the USA where it peaked in 1952 in New York.

The strategy to eradicate, or at least contain polio, was to be - Mass Vaccination—Surveillance—Outbreak Containment copying that which resulted in Smallpox eradication in 1977.

Sabin's oral vaccination was used in mass immunisation in— Czechoslovakia - USSR - Cuba - Chile - Uruguay - Nicaragua - Brazil - Japan - India - Israel and England.
However it has been endemic in 125 countries until recently.

The Eradication Programme to date has saved 16 million children from being paralyzed and has prevented an estimated 650,000 new cases of polio each year.

2· 5 Billion yes 2·5 Billion children have been immunised and 1·5 million deaths through Polio have been averted, along with 5·4 million child deaths for measles - yellow fever - tetanus and cholera by the Polio Plus programme.

As he said our **Aim** is to **Eradicate not just Control** - good as this may be.

As a holder of an HGV licence the volunteer centre used Peter to assess new mini bus drivers who like him

supported the disabled games at Coventry and Rugby.

As well as driving a mini bus for the stroke club Peter was the co-ordinator of the driver roster, a function he continued after he left Rotary. He also continued to collect and return the Past President's board after each update.

A keen sailor, Peter was involved in taking youngsters to Sailability where they learned to sail on a specially adapted dinghy.

Peter had the bearing and deep voice which matched his national service in the Life Guards and driver of an armoured personnel carrier. The Life Guards together with the Blues and Royals form the Household Cavalry.

A little known piece of Peter's history is that he once went for a trial with the Leicester Tigers in the days of amateur players.

Well known in the farming community, Peter was a sales representative for Bibby's animal feeds.

Using his HGV licence he was an occasional lorry driver for fellow Rotarian Malcolm Clarke.

A party of 10 Rotarians attended the Service of Thanks - giving in Cosby on Friday 25th May.

He will be missed by all who knew him.
