## **Albert Costa MP opens the renovated Narrows Gardens in Lutterworth 15th December**

"It is nice to feel in the midst of a fierce national debate about BREXIT, that we don't lose sight of developments that mean something directly to the people in our own Lutterworth" said Alberto Costa MP at the opening of the renovated Narrows Gardens off Market Street before the Original Factory Shop.



Alberto was there to inspect the work the Rotary Club of Lutterworth had put into reviving a formerly neglected area linking Market Street and George Street, through to the Library and Lutterworth's two major supermarkets.

The area had fallen into a sad and overgrown state. Following extensive debris clearance, weed treatment, the additional of over 10 tons of topsoil and compost, weed membrane, at least 40 plants and slate shale topping, the area now looks much more welcoming. It will improve even more over the coming years as the plants establish themselves, and it should prove a useful amenity for the Town.

The work was funded by the Rotary Club of Lutterworth, as well as the Rotary Foundation itself, which is the main charitable arm of Rotary in UK. As was pointed out by Sally Hollis the President Elect of the Club, the Rotary Club of Lutterworth were pleased to do something for the local community who continue to support their fundraising events. The work itself was done by members of the Club.

At a short ceremony on Saturday morning 15th December, the event was witnessed by Tony Hiron on behalf of Brian Poulter the Town Mayor, Dorothy Greaves who was instrumental in triggering this work, and Sheila Chambers of the Craft Shop who had previously worked on the area.

Other attendees were Rotarians and Friends of Rotary who had all played a part in seeing the project through to completion.

### **Robert (Bob) Derrick**

**1931** (2nd July) - **2018** (20th December)

It is sad to report that Rotarian Bob Derrick died peacefully in Leicester Royal Infirmary on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> December. He will be greatly missed by all his friends and family.

Bob was born in Castle Donnington on 2nd July 1931, the middle son of three born to Kathleen and Arthur Derrick.



After leaving school he worked at Slack and Parr, Kegworth but soon tiring of this he decided to join the Marines. A friend persuaded him to join the Navy instead.

His first assignment was on the "Royal Arthur" shore based at Cors-ham, Wiltshire followed by H.M.S. Ceres, York, where he trained to be a "Junior Assistant Cook". The next move was to H.M.S. Mariner, a Mine Sweeper, where he was on 'fishery protection' for eighteen months trying to keep our fishermen out of trouble.

After visiting a lot of countries including Iceland, Norway, Denmark, Belgium and Germany, he was transferred to H.M.S. Hornbill a Naval Air Station near Culhum and Abingdon. The first thing the Chief Cook said was that he had heard good things about Bob so he was put in the Petty Officer's Galley where he could get promotion.

Here he worked with Petty Officer Len Glover, a Leicester man, from whom he learnt a lot.

During his time in the Navy Bob took part in N A T O exercises and finally he was asked by the Draft Commander if he would like to serve on H.M. Yacht Britannia. He served there as Leading Hand on the Yacht for his last ten months in the Navy leaving on 1st July 1956. He then worked at Castle Donnington Power Station for the next thirty-three years most of the time as Operations Supervisor.

Bob met Eileen in the Airport Club in 1968 and they got married on 5th August 1970. They moved to Lutterworth in 1988 where he retired the following year.

Having retired he joined Lutterworth Rotary in 1992 and became President in 2000 and obtained a Paul Harris Award in 2005 with his wife Eileen for the work they had done through the Club for "Aquaboxes" and "Vision Aid Overseas".



They used to run a coffee morning each Thursday collecting for the Aquaboxes a charity very close to Bobs heart.

He was a real gentleman always impeccably dressed and respected by all who met him something he would have denied – Bob was just Bob who took no sides. In his eyes everyone was on a level playing field.

He will be greatly missed in the town and the club to which he did so much.



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
